CSIW2010 SHARJAH INTERNATIONAL SHOW JUMPING CHAMPIONSHIP

THE SHARJAH INTERNATIONAL SHOW JUMPING CHAMPIONSHIP IS CERTAINLY A VERY SPECIAL ONE WITH ALL THE HORSES AND RIDERS ALSO FITTING THIS SET. THUS FAR, WHEN A SHOW CONTINUES FOR TEN YEARS, WITH YEARLY EFFORTS TO PERFECT DETAILS AND TEST THEM YEAR AFTER YEAR, THOSE EFFORTS CREATE A TRADITION OF EFFICIENCY THAT INSPIRES THE RIDERS AS WELL AS THE WHOLE NETWORK OF PEOPLE AT THE SHOW.

SHARJAH IS THE THIRD LARGEST OF SEVEN EMIRATES THAT MAKE UP THE UNITED ARAB EMIRATES, THE SHARJAH **EQUESTRIAN & RACING CLUB (SERC) WHERE THE CHAMPIONSHIP TOOK** PLACE, OFFERS BOTH HORSERACING AND **RIDING JUST 20 MINUTES** FROM THE CITY CENTRE. THE CLUB HAS THE LARGEST INDOOR ARENA IN THE MIDDLE EAST AND A RACECOURSE WITH GRANDSTAND SEATING FOR 1,500 PEOPLE, **PROVIDING OUTSTANDING** SPECTATOR FACILITIES. THE CLUB ORGANISES HACKS THROUGH THE DESERT DURING COOL MONTHS OF THE YEAR AND INTERNATIONAL **ARABIAN HORSE** FESTIVAL.

SHEIKH ABDULLA BIN MAJID AL QASSIMI Honourary President of the Sharjah Equestrian & Racing Club:

On the support of the SERC to its riders & infrastructure of the club:

"The government of the Shariah Emirate supports all sports with the riders at the club receiving good support as the equestrian sport is commonly a demanding and expensive one, so we do try to prop up all the riders fully. We started with a very sound infrastructure (the largest indoor arena in the Middle East) that was developed and upgraded every year, and I certainly do hope this infrastructure produces the pursued results. Having said so, we make mistakes and should we not, we would be stagnant with no achievements. Consequently, we analyse our mistakes, turn them around to success through recognising them, analysing them and finding solutions or alternatives. Year after year, small achievements together make put big а achievement. This is our 10th year to hold the event, and as I have mentioned, we learn from our mistakes and try to improve the show annually. For example, this is the first year to hold a Puissance competition that was great to watch

and the club has an IT Director, Aziz Haroun, a genius if I may say so, that is fully appointed to manage the timing system. We hence would not need to appoint experts from abroad for this matter, but depend on our club engineer."

On the composing and training of the SERC team:

"Our team is quite developed however, we like to keep a special emphasis on junior riders as they would be the base and continuity of any training programme. Given this emphasis, we are thrilled to see two of our Sharjah riders qualify for the World Equestrian Games; Mohamed Al Hajiri and my son Majid were junior riders and their good training along with their dedication has put them in those spots. I am also delighted to see a team representing the UAE during the World Cup."

On HT covering the event & the optimistic comments from all participants and officials on the SERC:

"We thank your magazine for being here to cover this event, and I am very happy to hear that many of the visitors and competitors find the show to be of a different atmosphere compared to others."



MR. SULTAN MOHAMED AL YAHYAEE Event Director:

On the Sharjah Equestrian Club:

"We are happy to learn that whoever is part of the event was pleased during the three day show. This all goes back to the working staff and team that exerts all the effort and dedicate their time to make sure matters are efficient to all organisers, riders, along with the media. As you've seen we have around 23 countries competing here and as much as we can, we try to open up the club for as many riders as possible. We also seek to develop this show to a 5* event and we certainly hope our plans come into effect."

On the big number of the UAE team starting up from SERC:

"Most of the UAE riders first started at the SERC as we have a training school not just for jumping but for all equestrian disciplines. However the show jumping discipline really attracts most of the trainees and with the support from the club management and the ruler of Sharjah to all enthusiasts, I think technical studies show that the SERC is moving in the right direction."

On the aspirations for the SERC:

Of course, we try to focus on the qualifications for Arab League events but in the near future, we'd love to see one of the SERC riders qualifying for the Olympics. We are still happy to see that several qualified for the WEG and the UAE qualifying for the WC as when someone or a team wins at any event, credit goes to the whole team; this indicates that there is a structured system behind the training and I think this is what's evident here."





SHEIKH MAJID AL QASSIMI, UAE:

On his horse:

"I've had my horse for two years now ever since I first participated at the SERC shows. He performs very well during all Grand Prixs – he's good and very careful. I used to ride 135 heights but I think he has given me extra confidence to jump higher classes."

On his short-term plans:

"I plan to invest more time into becoming a better rider with my horse because presently, I'm not happy with my riding even though I've done well. This is not even 20% of what I want to achieve. A requiring sport needs sacrifice in many ways, which this is, so you either do it all the way or don't do it at all. Currently, I feel I can develop my skills further; I'm planning on competing at more 5* shows so I can gain more experience."

OLAF PETERSEN, GERMANY: Course Designer:

On the development of the show jumping sport in the Middle East:

"I'm quite fascinated by the development really since I've been designing lots of courses in the region in the past years. With the small classes, I think there is a need for improvement and more help. Then again, there are super horses in those classes that can jump higher and a good horse needs not only a good rider, but also a good trainer. I see super performances in top classes but not in the small ones. Not just in this region, but also in Japan and the USA for example, I think this is the general impression."

On his years of coming to the Middle East, is opinion on how the region sees the development & his thoughts on further development:

"I came to design in this region eight or nine times, and I do feel they see the development too. Take the Puissance which is very popular in Germany but not in this region; I'm personally not a big fan, but it was the first time for it take place here. I kept thinking to myself, how do I do it? I don't know the horses! And after the riders competed, I was happy with the results knowing that they were able to set the record of 202cm. Therefore, yes! Development is evident."

NOAF BIN ESSA, KUWAIT:

On the development of Kuwaiti riders:

"I am currently focused on both riding and home training some riders starting from one meter to 140cm. I do compete at most Arab League events as the development of the sport in Kuwait is not as it used to be and so we as riders try to develop individually. We as Kuwaiti riders do not show the best results at shows because only three to four riders can jump big classes and unfortunately Kuwait cant make it big with only four riders! Nevertheless, here we are and competing which is still very good."

Holiday International Sharjah Accumulator 125cm height, 15,000 AED prize money, 83 starts:

First the UAE's Arif Ahmed riding U-Ottie, second the UAE's Sarah Taryam riding Tofino De Lys & third Oman's Sultan Al Tooqi riding Remember

Longines Challenge 135cm height, 22,000 AED prize money, 60 starts:

First Egypt's Ahmed Tolba riding Krakota Jac, second KSA's Ramzy Al Duhami riding T Vivaldy & third the UAE's Abdullah Humaid riding Tip Top

Saif Zone Cup Puissance, 135cm height, 42,000 AED, 16 starts:

Up at 2.2cm in height, all equal in First place with the decision to not elevate the fence: the UAE's Sheikh Shakhboot Al Nahayan riding Linotte De Groom, Germany's Bjorn Biedermann riding Accord & the KSA's Ramzy Al Duhami riding Laurin B.

The KSA's Fahad Al Eid riding Uderich, the UAE's Mohamed Al Kumaiti riding Al Mutawakel. the UAE's Ali Al Kumaiti riding Al Mutamaken, and Iran's Farhang Sadeghi riding Tienes cleared up until 192cm. Egypt's Diaa Amr Beshir riding Apollo Hoefijzer cleared 181cm but took a crash to retire at 192cm.

Germany's Lena Timm riding Companero and the UAE's Abdullah Humaid riding Quatro H finished at 181cm.

Spain's Juan Fernandes De Mesa riding Tarzan, the UAE's Hamad Kirbi riding Liebe, Jordan's Ghassan Qassar riding Bon Coeur, and Qatar's Abulrahman Al Marri riding Denni Jones finished at 160cm, with the KSA's Abudllah Al Sharbatli riding Equis Quebec refusing the first jump.





PERISCOPE ON JESSICA KÜRTEN

WHEN INTERVIEWING JESSICA KÜRTEN, ONE CANNOT BUT BECOME IMPRESSED WITH HER CALCULATED SUBTLE VISION AND HER PRECISE AND SHEER ANALYTICAL CHARACTER. THERE IS REMARKABLE DEPTH IN HER PERSONALITY AND MOSTLY, HER SERENE YET FOCUSED PERCEPTION OF THE FUTURE.



JESSICA KÜRTEN WAS BORN IN CULLYBACKY, IN THE NORTH OF IRELAND ON NOVEMBER 24TH 1969. SHE IS THE DAUGHTER OF A DENTIST AND AN ARTIST. HER FATHER CHESNEY SUCCESSFULLY BRED HORSES AND HER MOTHER ROSEMARY ALWAYS SUPPORTED THE HORSEY PASSION OF HER 5 CHILDREN. THIS LOVE OF YOUNG JESSICA FIRST CONCENTRATED ON A DONKEY NAMED MR. PORRIDGE, WHO WAS OBVIOUSLY ABLE, TO SHOW HIS STILL VERY YOUNG RIDER THE SUBSTANTIAL CRITERIA OF THE HORSE SPORT...

STILL YOUNG, JESSICA CHESNEY CAUSED A FURORE AS A PONY RIDER; SHE WAS 2 TIMES IRISH CHAMPION, AND LATER A JUNIOR RIDER. THE HOBBY LATER ON CHANGED INTO PROFESSION WITH A DIPLOMA WITHIN HORSE ECONOMY, JESSICA CHESNEY BECAME A PROFESSIONAL SHOW JUMPING AMAZONE AND WAS ESTABLISHED INTO THE FIRST CLASS PROFESSIONALS ON THE EMERALD ISLAND.

SINCE 1994 JESSICA'S FELLOW COUNTRYMEN LOST TO A CERTAIN EXTENT THEIR SUCCESS GUARANTOR, BECAUSE IN THIS YEAR THE AMAZONE MOVED TOGETHER WITH ECKARD KÜRTEN TO HÜNXE (RHINELAND). IN THE MEANTIME, BOTH ARE MARRIED AND LIVE WITH HORSES SURROUNDING THEM AND THE ENTIRE TEAM IN HÜNXE, WITH JESSICA STILL STARTING FOR IRELAND. THE YARD, NOT FAR FROM THE FERERAL ROAD (BUNDESSTRASSE) 58, IS IN THE MIDST OF FAR LANDSCAPE AND OFFERS PLENTY OF SPACE FOR LIFE WITH THE HORSES.

What do you think are the elements of success in this sport and despite the presence of most or all the elements, do you think success is a choice?

I think the key to success is a combination of horse and rider. At this level, it's important that the horse and rider are really a team. Obviously, everything around; the management and people you work with in your stable, are all very important. Matters need to be harmonious and everybody within the team needs to have the same goal and support. It is a very demanding sport; we have to ride the whole day everyday all year, and it's also very difficult because no matter how much you invest from your own time and from your own substance, it still doesn't mean you will win. You have to have a horse who is also in top form, has the ability and obviously, the two together have to be in form in order to create a winning formula. Having said so, I certainly think that success is not a choice, but it is something you

build towards and with experience success breeds more success. Nevertheless, I certainly do believe, having been in the sport for so long - that you as a rider can motivate yourself to try a little bit harder especially at a big event. I would be able to put a little extra pressure on myself and say that I must try harder and I think the horses notice this. As I mentioned, if you have a very good team, surely that would bring along good success. In addition, if you as a rider believe in your own horse vou can have an awful lot more success than if you say that he is iust a horse.

What about managing your time?

I normally ride all day, which means that I do not have time to look at the things in the office. My husband contributes with his time and is my manager; we discuss the planning of the calendar together. The horses and training is my area and the management around it is his area. It's

difficult to do it on your own! I'm a great believer that horses are intelligent animals and I believe that some horses understand the sport better than others. I know certainly when I ride my best horses at an important event they probably feel my nerves a little bit which I think spins them also to be better.

Who were your most important sponsors?

I was very lucky to have good owners through my career. Starting with my parents, when I finished my exams in school my father bought me a five year old that I took the whole way up to Olympic and World Cup levels, and I was fortunate there were large amounts of money to invest. Upon meeting my husband and moving to Germany, I was lucky to have other good owners. I get my horses young and I produce them. Now for six years, I've been working with Lady Gorgina Forbes from Ireland who is a great breeder and I'm lucky to have lovely horses that she's breeding or ones that we've bought together. Furthermore, companies like GPA sponsor me for my clothes, obviously, the owners are very important in this sport and I think they are the key people.

How do you choose a horse?

I think when you try a horse you have to like it, when you see it you have to like it, when you sit on it you have to like it, when you jump it you have to like it, and when you see the video of it jumping you have to like it! That is for me a very important part. For me I like very much a blood horse and not so much the big type because they are for the sport, and are faster and normally more careful. I always imagine what it would be when the horse gets experience and I have a vision of what the horse could become.

Would you ride a good horse regardless of its breed?

Horses come from everywhere. I've had wonderful Irish horses, French, German, and Dutch horses, I even had one horse which did not come into sport till she was eight years old and became a European Champion. I find that there is a lovely story behind horses, where they come from and whom they were with. Therefore, I think one has to always keep and open mind.

What do you think of the development of the show jumping sport in the Middle East?

It's not easy as this is not the climate for the sport and, everything has to come from outside and a lot of effort has to be put in - yet I can see a lot of interest and some riders showing a lot of talent and naturally, need to be supported.

How do you see the investment of the Middle East in the show jumping sport as an industry?

It has to be structured with the support of the passionate individuals in the game. It's not enough to say we have some riders and a trainer, it has to start at the very bottom. The knowledge has to be built up from the bottom with children and ponies, competitions for young riders, which takes time, but if enough effort is put into that structuring phase, there is a good chance that the sport will be strong in Middle Eastern countries.

Do you have special plans for the upcoming three years?

Yes, I am delighted with how my two horses are developing; I think 'Mutty' and 'Cosmo' are developing to be top Grand Prix horses. I also want to go to the Olympics in London, obviously Ireland has to qualify first and I'm hoping to be part of the team. I have goals but I'm not good at saying what I would like to do because it's not like me to go out saying I went to do that, but I'm going to keep on quietly working and keep on producing my horses and maybe will pop up in the next couple of years and have a big moment.

KAMAL BAHAMDAN COMMITMENT TO BUSINESS PASSION FOR SHOW JUMPING

WHAT WOULD YOU CALL TRAVELLING TO INDIA FOR A BUSINESS MEETING AND THEN BACK TO ABU DHABI WITHIN 24 HOURS TO WIN A 3-STAR GRAND PRIX ARAB LEAGUE QUALIFIER? SOME WOULD SAY IT'S EXCELLENT TIME MANAGEMENT AND VIGOROUS MENTAL FITNESS TO BE ABLE TO CARRY OUT SUCH A SCHEDULE. I PERSONALLY WOULD SAY IT'S CONSPIRING WITH TIME! THOUGH ONE WISHES TO BELIEVE THAT IT'S POSSIBLE FOR A DAY TO HAVE MORE THAN 24 HOURS, THE RESOUNDING CONCLUSION IS THAT THERE AREN'T ENOUGH HOURS IN THE DAY; SO HOW DOES KAMAL BAHAMDAN SUCCEED IN DOING ALL THAT HE WANTS IN THE ALLOTTED TIME PERIOD?

A 4-time Olympic rider, serious but very soft-spoken active investor and an avid show jumper - Bahamdan runs a holding conglomerate, travels up to 150 days a year, rides horses three to four days a week, competes Saudi Arabia locally for and internationally, and enjoys building investment platforms. "I wish I had more time to spend in the saddle", he says longingly. This 39 year old graduate visionary, а of Manufacturing Engineering from Boston University, co-founded and managed BV Group in 1994 in the USA, and in light of his strategic views of the changing economy and markets, as well as to address the needs for a new breed of investment houses arising from the last financial crisis, he established Safanad in 2009, a company with a unique approach to investments specialised in real estate, private equity, and marketable securities - based in Geneva and New York, and soon in Saudi Arabia. Even with such a full work agenda, Bahamdan manages to keep his business life completely separate from his show jumping career, but somehow the latter trickled into the world of finance by naming his

new company Safanad, described in the mystic times of Prophet Solomon as the horses/pure breed who absorbed him from his daily chores.

Saudi Growing up in Arabia, Bahamdan credits his parents who supported him fully in his business and show jumping career. "I consider myself very fortunate as I am able to combine my passion with mv profession. I am an entrepreneur who enjoys building companies but I am also a rider who enjoys every aspect of the equestrian sport. I have been able to pursue both careers hand in hand and am thankful to my parents who have been supportive from the beginning. I come from a large family; I'm one of six siblings and an uncle to eight lovely nieces and nephews."

Besides his business endeavours and next to show jumping, Bahamdan enjoys playing golf, football and skiing. "I am very serious about my skiing! And I've played football since I was a child", he says. Football caused him a knee injury which prevented his taking part in a whole show jumping season. In regards to his show jumping career and his passion for horses, he adds, "Show jumping has been part of my life for as long as I remember. I started at the age of seven and competed in Saudi mostly Arabia and occasionally in Europe until I moved to the USA for college. There I took part in the East Coast Circuit until 2003 when I moved my horses back to Europe. They are based there where I frequently travel to train and participate at show jumping events. I have been lucky enough to take part in four Olympic Games and three World Championships as well as three Pan Arab Games where I won four team gold medals and one individual gold. However, competing in the Olympics is an experience like no other, which is unique and memorable everytime. What makes every Olympic experience unique is being there with athletes from all over the world, competing in all disciplines; they dedicated their whole life for this moment, creating a unique energy. Each game indeed has its own flair and is different from the other and is equally memorable, a common denominator being that the Olympics is the ultimate experience."

As for sponsors and trainers (two core elements in this ever demanding sport) Bahamdan again credits his family effusively. "Due to my business commitments. I cannot have sponsors. However, my family has been my most important sponsor throughout my career. On my training, it's been with many great trainers: Anne Kursinski, Beezie Madden, Nelson Pessoa, and currently with Jan Tops. I travel a great deal, and naturally I find much difficulty with time management, and often have to sacrifice my training time for work. When travelling, I always plan ahead of time and I try to work or sleep on the plane to maximise my time at the country I am travelling to and to be more efficient."

On his horses, he further adds, "In today's sport, courses are very technical. Therefore I go for blood, agile, and careful horses. Currently, I have 2 very nice Chestnuts: Mashalla Rivaal and Pinochetta. Mashalla Rivaal is a horse with great character, careful with a lot of fight in him yet sensitive. Outside the ring, he has a very calm personality, is very sociable, and very pleasant to

ride. When he steps into the ring, he grows a foot taller and gets an adrenaline rush, which is so high that he often spends more time bucking between the first few jumps until he starts concentrating. However, his great ability and agility compensate for his playfulness. On the other hand, Pinochetta is a very spooky and hectic mare outside the ring but the minute she steps into the ring she is all business: very focused and competitive. While she is not as scopy as Rivaal she is a very fast and careful mare. My ideal horse is rideable with blood, careful with heart, and scopy however these are very hard to find. Of course when one picks a horse, he should always keep the job in mind: meaning if a young rider needs a horse to help him move to higher classes, more emphasis should be placed on ridability, scope, and experience, and less on carefulness."

On upcoming aspirations and his short-term plans, Bahamdan is preparing for the WEG in Kentucky in October of this year. His preparation plans include taking part in the Global Champions Tour this summer.

In regards to whether Bahamdan could influence the show jumping sport and the decisions that he would take, what would he change? He answered, "I would focus on further increasing the popularity of the sport by bringing the sport to the people through having more shows in major cities, which would increase its visibility. In the Middle East, horses are part of our history and heritage; we should cherish it and continue developing this heritage as a key sport to our generations. My advice to young riders would be: everytime you sit on a horse at a competition or while training, start by embarrassing your love to the sport and horses and hold that feeling until you are done."

On defining success in the show jumping sport versus success in life in general – and how to combine them to achieve the same end result, he states with conviction, "Success is about fulfilment. It's about achieving personal goals, albeit in sport or life in general. In my opinion, one is only successful if he is able to fulfil his personal goals whilst finding a fine balance in all other important aspects of his life, which is a goal in itself."

Besides his charity works, Mr. Jadaan explains, "I actually perform many things in many fields which are generally related to the Arabian horse in Syria. In addition, I am an executive committee member of the WAHO; I carry out some services to member Arab countries involved in the Arabian horse industry worldwide. However, my main business is real estate development. I also write; as the President of the Board of Directors of Al Quds Institution (Syria) and as a Member of Trustees, I am the Editor-In-Chief of Zahrat Al Maidan monthly magazine published through the institution." On his involvement with the Arabian horse in Syria, he adds, "I'm a breeder and contribute continually alongside others who are interested in the shaping of the modern history of the Arabian horse in Syria. By that, I mean its registration and development, aiming to bring back the vital historical role of Syria in the field of the Arabian horse to the present, and into the future."

When asking horse enthusiasts about the start of their love for the horse, their memories take them back in time. "It started very early in my childhood. I think the passion for the horse in general is born with us; it is in human nature. The difference lies in how involved one is with horses, the passion is there in all of us - it's really how close you are to them; the closer you are, the more passionate you become."

On becoming an International Judge and the establishment of the Jadaan Stud Farm, Mr. Jadaan adds, "Five or six years ago, I passed an ECAHO seminar course and exam and I got listed in the B List Category of the ECAHO approved Judges. I gained much experience through judging at many shows ever since and soon I will become eligible for the A List Category. I established my stud farm back in 1985; Jadaan Stables. I breed Syrian Bedouin horses and now there are horses that I can label as fifth generation. My horses are all of Syrian

Bedouin origin; I started with five mares that I got from the Shammar and Tai tribes and my horses have competed in Syrian National Shows and won many titles. I like all lines of Arabian horses. but as a Syrian who is involved with Syrian horses, I think there is a special connection between the Syrian Arabian and myself. I think it's a most intriguing task to study and work further on their development - bringing back to them the quality that they had before and was lost somehow. It's a joyful challenge to bring back what these breeds gave to the world. Having said so, I believe through selective breeding we can bring back to the Syrian Arabians all the elements they miss, through which we can preserve other important fundamentals that the Arabian horse around the world has lost such as its athletic abilities, good legs, intelligence, good nature and tranguil mentality. What makes The Syrian horse special is that they are the foundation horses of modern Arabian horse breeding. They represent the true Arabian horse in its original surroundings, which comes directly from the breeding of its original breeders; Arab tribes, clans and families." Stressing more on the role of the Arabian horse in Syria, he continues, "The Arabian horse in Syria

is our pride, it's connected to our history, religion and it's a part of our heritage. As for its improvement, we are working hard towards giving the aspiring generations of breeders a horse who presents a living history. The position of horse breeding and activities in Syria these days has never been better, but there is still plenty to implement."


A horse is a genetic pool; on the other hand, a horse is what a breeder makes it. How can a breeder create the next champion? Mr. Jadaan states, "A breeder can do his best with selection, pedigree analysis, good care, good feeding and training, along with naturally, God's will at the beginning and at the end since he is the creator. A breeder should also be patient and tolerant, and should learn from his experiences. Furthermore, has to be optimistic and at the end, his breeding programme should lead him in the correct direction eventually. This horse is such a blessed creature and those who breed him will feel the essence and goodness which are bonded to his forelock until the day of judgement, as it was said by the messenger of God, Mohamed (PBUH)." 👘

KARIM BADARO AJUDGE... AND POPULAR

INTERNATIONAL SHOW JUMPING JUDGE KARIM BADARO IS ONE OF MANY ARABS WHO HAVE ATTAINED THE HIGHEST CLASSIFICATION OF JUDGING. POPULAR AMONGST HIS PEERS, A PEOPLE'S PERSON, AND KNOWN FOR HIS ATTRACTIVE SHOW COMMENTARY VOICE, BADARO GRADUATED AS INTERNATIONAL JUDGE IN 2003 WHEN HE CHOSE THE MIDDLE EAST AND THE ARAB REGION TO CONTINUOUSLY OFFICIATE IN. FOR THE PAST SEVEN YEARS, BADARO HAS BEEN A LEADING FIGURE IN JUDGING AND IS CERTAINLY A TREMENDOUS ASSET TO THE FEI.



Badaro was born in Lebanon where he began his riding career at the age of nine. A junior champion of Lebanon at eleven, he stopped riding at the onset of the Lebanon war in 1975, but then picked up his riding in 1990 when the war was over. Married to Tania who hates animals in general and horses in particular, the 49 year old is a father of 3 children, a based in Beirut trader in raw material, holds a Masters Degree in Developmental Economics, has been teaching Finance Courses for seven years at the American University of Beirut, and is the Regional Representative of the Internal Judges Club (Middle East and Arab countries).

Badaro started by mentioning, "Once I graduated as International Judge in 2003 I was asked which territories I would prefer to officiate in. My answer was the Middle East and the Arab region. It was a good choice especially that the Arab League (12 shows per season) kicked-off a year later. Normally, it is the Organising Committee of each show that extends invitations to officials and it is the FEI that appoints Foreign Judges. I usually get two or three Foreign Judge assignments per season. In addition, I also get FEI odd assignments: FEI Olympic Games Assessing Delegate (2008), the All Africa Games (2007), etc...

Badaro continued, "One of the FEI pre-requirements for international judges is to have ridden at international levels. Not all judges have fulfilled this requisite! I took my first seminar for jumping judges in 1993 with world-renowned Course Director & Judge Switzerland's Hans Briscghi who dedicated a big part of his career to educate judges. The most recognisable names in European judging followed his courses back in the 80's. I then took an International lane in 2003 after having attended a seminar with Belgium's Francis Michielsens, who also happens to be the Chairman and founder of the 'International Judges Club'. In order to stay updated, all active international judges have to attend "refresher seminars"; I have

already attended two; 2006 in Zurich and 2007 in Doha."

As a judge, Badaro shared his thoughts on the challenges he faces and whether or not there is room today for development in any of the existing rules of the FEI as we do know them, since there are some amendments that happen annually. "Judging shows is not an easy task; many variables are taken into account. It is not as reading the rules and applying them...it goes beyond this. The saying goes, "a judge has to judge". This is exactly what it has gotten down to. Situations have to be evaluated before appropriate decisions are taken. This is why we are not titled as "referees", but "judges". As for the existing rules, they are constantly under reviewing consequently showing the flexibility of the bodies governing our sport. It is only through practice and experience that a judge can see the broader picture and can foresee possible changes that benefit all performers of this sport: the riders, the horses, the

owners, the show and the spectators. Today, I am happy with the rules as they are written, however some refinement ought to be brought in. It is only through practice that a judge sees the need for such adaptations to modern show jumping."

Spoken about the development of the rules, Badaro added more on the status of judges in the Arab region, "The status of officials (Judges, Course Designers, and Stewards) has evolved with the recent development of the sport in our part of the world. The Arab League has done a great deal, as far as the level of riders, their horses and the level of competitions concerned. are Accordingly, the sport has reached a level of professionalism. Naturally, the status of Arab Officials has followed course. After having many generations of benevolent and very capable Arab Officials, who were there only for the love of the horse, we now have a generation of professional Arab Officials who are in close contact with the development of the sport and are always up to date. This adds a definite "plus" to the sport."

AN EGYPTIAN IDOL

ABDELKADER SAID WAS THE YOUNGEST AND LEAST **EXPERIENCED SHOW JUMPER** AT THE LONDON **INTERNATIONAL HORSE** SHOW AT OLYMPIA. COMPETING ON A WILDCARD. HE PUT ASIDE THE WHITAKER FAMILY'S DOMINATION OF THE SHOW WHEN HE AND 'AVENIR' WON THE EARLS COURT OLYMPIA **COMPETITION AFTER A SENSATIONAL 13-HORSE** JUMP-OFF THAT BROUGHT THE PACKED GRAND HALL TO FEVER PITCH.

Michael Whitaker on 'Portofino', one of 3 members of the family to win at the competition, was 11th to go in the jump-off and went into the lead with a lightning round of 32.67 seconds. When his niece Ellen cleared with 0.13 seconds off his time on 'Equimax Ocolado', her round was greeted as the winning one with prolonged applause.

However, Said answered the challenge with a breathtaking round on a horse he started riding only in March, stopping the clock on 32.12 seconds and bringing the crowd to its feet. Edwina Alexander, the winner of the 2008 Olympia World Cup and ranked 6th in the world, was last into the arena and gave her all on 'Cevo Itot du Chateau' but still failed to catch Said - finishing second in 32.20.

Said started riding at the age of 4 at Alexandria Sporting Club in Alexandria. Now at 20, he soon was reach top levels able to of competition, being a sturdy team member always representing Egypt at major championships. Trained by Emil Hendrix, Said is now based in Belgium - his parents having moved from Egypt when he was a child to help him to further his show jumping career.

How was it like to be present at the Olympia arena competing with top names from the show jumping circuit?

I was a little nervous of course because

I wanted to do my best! The arena is very small at Olympia; it's a tiny ring with big jumps! The nice thing about it is that it was packed with seats of 10,000 people. Whilst jumping, you really feel the crowd behind you. The big jumps in a small and very spooky arena meant that the jumps came around very fast; I needed to have a plan and stick to it.

Did you expect you'd have a clear round in the class – a class where the top riders were unable to jump clear?

Well of course you have to believe you can do it. I was hoping for a clear but I didn't know before the class that I would go clear in the Grand Prix or the big class.

After your first round, did you believe you could win Olympia?

My horse 'Avenir' jumped superbly in the first round, and so I was hoping for a high placing. However when Michael Whitaker took the lead with his niece Ellen beating his time, I got excited when I heard the crowd cheer and went for it as much as I could.

Tell us about your build-up plans to be placed at Olympia?

Before going to London, I was just hoping to do my best and see how far I can go. It was 'Avenir's' first major championship anyhow, so my expectations were realistic.

What gives you motivation and confidence to win?

I have to say 'Avenir' was in fantastic shape; that along with the packed arena certainly boosted my motivation.

How did it feel to stand as the winner at such a big event, hearing the national anthem of your country played?

I was very proud of course. It was a nice moment to see the Egyptian flag raised at the Olympia Grand Hall. It was in way a thanks to all the people who support me and still do until this day. Many thanks go to my family, Team Harmony of HRH Princess Haya bint AI Hussein, and all the Egyptians who believe in me and show constant support.

Do you have any words of encouragement and advice to the young riders who wish to achieve what you have?

Well I think for one to become a successful rider, it takes more than just talent. I think its management, motivation, hard work and determination. Keep working at what you want and stay with your feet on the ground even when success comes. Always set high goals, have a plan and an objective to work for.







FRED ARCHER A racing legend and 'the best all-round jockey the Turf has ever seen,' according to a tribute in the National Horseracing Museum. Fred, who rode 2,748 winners, won his first race aged 12 and went on to become champion jockey for 13 consecutive years until 1886, when he committed suicide. He was just 29 years old

AIME HAEGEMAN History in the making: the Belgian rider won the individual gold medal at the inaugural Olympic show jumping competition held in Paris in 1900



PRETTY POLLY Foaled in 1901, Pretty Polly won her first race, the British Dominion Plate at Sandown, by 10 lengths. She went on to win 22 out of her 24 races including the 1000 Guineas, the Oaks and the St Leger and was much loved by racegoers



CLEVER HANS An equine who, it was claimed, could perform arithmetic and other intellectual tasks. A formal investigation in 1907 revealed that the horse was actually responding directly to involuntary cues from the body language of his human trainer. But the 'Clever Hans effect' was important — it was a key development in understanding the observer-expectancy effect in animal cognition

EDWARD 'POP' GEERS The champion harness racer was the first to drive a horse under a two-mile minute. He won his first race in 1871 at the age of 20 and went on to break several world records in the 1880s



FULKE WALWYN Trained the winners of four Cheltenham Gold Cups, two Champion Hurdles and five King George VI Chases. Starting in 1946, he was champion jump trainer five times



BERNBOROUGH Bred in Queensland and sold as a yearling for 150guineas, this grandson of Gainsborough enjoyed a winning streak of 15 consecutive races between 1941 and 1946. He was eventually sold to movie mogul Louis B Mayer of MGM to stand at stud in Kentucky



HUMBERTO MARILES London bowed to the Mexican rider who won three medals at the 1948 London Olympics aboard Arete — two gold in individual and team show jumping and team bronze in eventing

HANS MOSER Dressage gold for Switzerland: the 47-year-old Swiss dressage rider brought home the individual gold medal at the 1948 London Olympics riding Golden Hummer



GERALD BALDING The last English team polo player to reach 10 goals. His career peaked in the mid-1930s and he died in the 1950s The Gerald Balding cup is named after him



CITATION A Triple Crown champion, the American racehorse won 16 major races in a row in the late 1940s and early '50s, and was the first horse to win over \$1million in prize-money



LUDWIG STUBBENDORF Won the team and individual eventing gold medals for Germany in the 1936 Berlin Olympic Games


ADIOS Born in 1940 in Indiana and described as 'the big daddy of harness racing', Adios was a multiple world champion during his racing career and went on to sire 589 offspring. He died in 1965 and is buried beneath his favourite apple tree

CAPTAIN RONNIE WALLACE Once described as 'head and shoulders above anyone else hunting', Captain Ronnie Wallace was a master and a huntsman for an astonishing 58 consecutive years from the early 1940s. Later, he was chairman of the Masters of Foxhounds Association for more than 20 years

PAT SMYTHE A leading light in British show jumping, Pat won myriad international competitions including a team bronze medal at the 1956 Stockholm Olympics — the first woman to ride in an Olympic show jumping event. She also wrote 16 books, including *Jump For Joy*, inspiring many young girls. After she gave up show jumping she was an international selector, chef d'equipe and president of the British Show Jumping Association





FRED WINTER The only person to have won the Cheltenham Gold Cup, the Champion Hurdle and the Grand National as jockey and trainer, which he achieved from 1947 to 1964. Fred is renowned for winning the 1962 Grand Steeple-Chase de Paris with a broken bit — no brakes, no steering





FOXHUNTER The only horse to win the King George V Gold Cup three times in 1948, 1950 and 1953, Sir Harry Llewellyn's famous bay has a memorial listing his achievements where he is buried — with his rider's ashes on a Welsh mountain near Abergavenny. He also had a Horse of the Year Show (HOYS) class named after him, which *H&H* sponsor



SIR HARRY LLEWELLYN A colonel in the army, Sir Harry Llewellyn (above left) was the only British rider to win an individual medal in show jumping, achieved at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics riding Foxhunter (above right), a horse with whom his name has been linked ever since

COLONEL FRANK WELDON The driving force behind the Badminton Horse Trials for many years and the first British rider to win an individual Olympic medal, he won bronze and team gold at the 1956 Stockholm Games with Kilbarry. Col Weldon went on to become director of the event (1965-1988) and a respected course-designer





KILBARRY Colonel Frank Weldon's Kilbarry is the only horse to have won at international level while still doing daily duty as an officer's charger





HIGH AND MIGHTY Twice winner of Badminton Horse Trials with Sheila Willcox, High And Mighty secured victory at the event in 1958 by a 47-point margin. He was sold to British rider Ted Walsh for Olympic team use, as women were still not allowed to compete in the Olympic three-day event at this time, but he was never selected

VINCENT O'BRIEN The trainer of three Grand National winners from 1952-54 and Cottage Rake, three-times Gold Cup winner in the 1950s, Vincent, twice crowned British champion trainer, was voted the greatest influence in racing history in a *Racing Post* poll in 2001.



SHEILA WILLCOX A three-times Badminton winner (from 1957-1959), Sheila was the first British lady event rider to achieve international success when she won team and individual gold medals at the 1957 European Championships with High And Mighty (below left)

HANS GUNTER WINKLER The German show jumper and selector began his Olympic medal-winning haul in 1956. He is the only show jumper to have won five gold medals — among his total of seven



LESTER PIGGOTT The greatest Flat jockey of all time, Lester rode a record 30 Classic winners and was crowned champion jockey 11 times in a career that spanned 46 years. His 4,493 winners place him second only to the brilliant Sir Gordon Richards in the list of all-time greats



WILF WHITE Show jumper Wilf White helped Britain secure the Prince of Wales Cup on five occasions from 1950-1954 riding Nizefela and became a household name. Alongside Sir Harry Llewellyn, Wilf won a team gold medal and just missed the individual at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics



HANS VON BLIXEN-FINECKE A passionate equestrian and trainer of Jane and Christopher Bartle, this Swedish rider, who later lived in Cornwall, won two eventing golds at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics




LT COL SIR PETER FARQUHAR One of the most influential post-war foxhound breeders during his mastership of the Portman between 1947 and 1959. He's father of current Beaufort huntsman lan



ARKLE Regarded as the greatest chaser ever, the Irish-bred horse won three Cheltenham Gold Cups in 1964-66. His *Timeform* rating of 210 is the highest ever awarded to a chaser





SEA BIRD II Considered by many to be the greatest post-war European Flat racehorse, Sea Bird II is most famous for his superlative performance in two of the world's most prestigious races — the 1965 Epsom Derby and the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe





HOW TO BE A TRAINER (Part 11) DRESSAGE FOR JUMPING (PART 1)

IT IS REGRETTABLE THAT SOME SHOW JUMPING RIDERS CONSIDER DRESSAGE AS UNNATURAL! THEY TALK ABOUT IT –AS IF IT WERE SOME FORM OF FOREIGN RIDING AND NOT REALLY NECESSARY FOR SCHOOLING SHOW JUMPING HORSES.

THE AIM:

The aim of jumping-dressage is to school and improve show jumping horses through systematic training on the flat. Dressage enhances not only the horse's strength, but also his gracefulness of movement aiming to train both the mind and the body of the horse so that he and the rider can achieve their long term goals in any equestrian sport.

BENEFITS:


Jumping-dressage is a long series of progressive exercises which develop the horse's movements, obedience, balance and jumping ability to the utmost degree. It is pleasant for a rider to jump such a horse as it will respond quickly to the rider's aids. For these reasons a show jumping rider should not overlook this article by telling himself that he knows all about dressage and sticks to reading only about jumping.

DIFFERENCE:

Jumping-dressage is not guite the same as dressage tests, however it involves the same principles. In classic dressage, the impulsion is used as a propulsive force in forward direction, while in jumping-dressage it is used to propel the horse not only forward, but also upward. A show jumper needs complete freedom of head and neck to be able to bascule over large obstacles. A show jumper must also be able to change fluently from a high degree of collection to an elastic degree of expansion in order to cope with spread fences. It must respond to the minimal use of aids in turning quickly and smoothly, along with having enough initiative and heart attempt to all obstacles. Therefore, dressage for a jumper cannot be the same as for a high level of a dressage horse.

THE ARENA:

There are two different sizes of dressage arenas (20 x 40m and 20 x 60m). Alphabetical markets are placed about 50cm outside the arena to guide the riders through their movements. The line between A and C is called the centre-line, while the line from B to E is the half-way line. The lines half-way between the long side and the centre-line are called the 34 lines. When riding alongside the board, you are said to be riding on the outside track; but when riding two to three meters in from the boards, you are said to be riding on the inside track. These terms and definitions are very important for the trainer and rider to know as to always be able to speak the same language.



Two Dressage Arenas: The 60 x 20m arena is the standard shape for higher level tests; the 40 x 20m arena is used for lower levels.

NATURAL BALANCE:

Grave mistakes can be made in schooling horses if one is uncertain about the natural balance of the horse in motion and in jumping. By nature every young horse moves in balance. From the first weeks of his life, he continues in the field without losing his balance or stumbling. Nevertheless, during the first few months of riding, the young horse with a rider on his back has great difficulties in maintaining his balance due to the additional force of gravity of the rider's weight.

BALANCE DIFFICULTIES:

To appreciate how difficult it is for a young horse to re-establish his natural balance while carrying the burden of a rider, imagine a burden one's own back. One on automatically places the burden above ones centre of gravity, which is between the shoulders; this is the easiest way to carry it. One reacts the same way as does a young horse trying to rebalance himself. One rounds his back and pushes the head and neck downward and forward. The weight would be twice as heavy if carried lower down on a hollow back. When the rider distributes his weight closer to the withers, he it easier and makes more comfortable for the horse to carry it. This gives the horse the chance to round his back and bring his hind-legs underneath. Both are very important for a show jumper to propel himself forward and upward.

EARLY SCHOOLING:

In the early stages of schooling, the young horse should therefore never be ridden "on the bit", but only on a loose or long rein, held finger tight. Only then the horse has the opportunity to regain his natural balance carrying a rider because he can move with a low head and neck carriage. This enables him, at this stage of schooling, to use his back and quarters freely. It is also very regrettable to see many horses not being given the time to first develop their muscles and balance before being pushed onto the bit and asked to move in a collected manner. Once the horse has re-established his natural balance on level ground, it could be ridden in a hilly terrain in a forward seat on a loose rein. This is excellent pre-training for the balance




Fig 1: Carrying weight easily & in balance above one's own centre of gravity

of a future show jumper. The horse relates his paces to the centre of gravity of the rider. That is why it is absolutely necessary that the rider on a young horse sits as still as possible.

STAGES OF SCHOOLING:

The progressive schooling programme, designed to achieve **collection** at the end, has to be followed step by step (never skip a stage).

Phase 1: showing the horse the way to the ground (relaxation and balance)

in all three paces, on a loose rein, maintaining impulsion.

Phase 2: engaging the inner hind-leg without lateral bending, making transitions along with the kicking board.

Phase 3: moving the quarters away from the track, lateral bending, activating the inner hind-leg (later the turn on the forehand).

Phase 4: turning on the haunches, depending on the standard of the


horse's schooling, it can be either a in proper timing, quarter or a half-turn. clearance. We have

Phase 5: riding the horse **on the bit** with collection; at first in walk then at trot and canter, increasing demands gradually. Always remember that it is sometimes quite wise to go back one phase but never skip one forward.

RIDING AIDS:

Going back a few issues of Horse Times, it was mentioned that the most developed part of the horse's brain is the memory. That's why applying different riding aids, according to the stage of schooling, should be adjusted in proper timing, amount and clearance. We have natural and artificial riding aids; natural ones are: weight (seat), leg, and rein aids, while artificial ones comprise of voice (not considered natural in my opinion), whip, spurs, and other artificial equipments (draw reins, chambon, etc.)

The rider's weight shifting to the right or left will cause the horse to turn right or left. The rider's centre of gravity should always be in harmony with the horse's centre of gravity. The rider's leg must hang close to the horse's sides, in touch, feeling but not gripping, forcing or flapping against the horse's sides. There are two types of leg aids: the forward driving (just behind the girth), and the sideways (guarding) which is applied further behind the girth. The hands of the rider should keep an even, elastic contact with the horse's mouth. We have different types of rein aids: receiving. yielding, non-allowing. restraining and open. Every non-allowing or restricting rein aid must be followed by a slightly yielding rein aid. To turn or to keep a young horse straight, we use the open reign aid, indicating the direction. Always put in mind that our goal is always the best performance with the minimal aids; think simple but efficient. 👘


